Many of the principal buildings started life as facilities for the village residents. **Hulme Hall** was the girls dining hall and is now a conference, banqueting and wedding centre, best known as the venue for Ringo Starr's first gig with the Beatles!

The former village swimming pool is now the site of the popular **Port Sunlight Garden Centre and Tea Room** - well worth a visit in any season.

The village also boasts **The Gladstone Theatre**. Originally the male workers dining hall it was opened by Prime Minister William Gladstone in 1891. It is a thriving community theatre and presents amateur and professional shows throughout the year.

The village is home to the prestigious **Lady Lever Art Gallery**, part of National Museums Liverpool. It houses one of the most beautiful collections of fine and decorative arts in the UK, including world class Pre-Raphaelite paintings by Millais and Rossetti. The art gallery and its cafe are open daily and are free to enter. The village also has excellent public sculptures, including the **War Memorial** designed by Welsh sculptor Sir William Goscombe John.

Don't miss **Christ Church**, one of the largest churches on Merseyside built by Lever as a personal gift to the village.

Discover the story of the village's creation at the Gateway attraction **Port Sunlight Museum** where you will meet the founder William Hesketh Lever and find out what life was like for the 'Sunlighters' who lived and worked here. Our staff will help you make the most of your visit to the village with self-guided trails and walking tours. Before you embark, make sure you take some time-out in the museum's traditional Tea Room.

Lever commissioned thirty different architects in the building of the village, which is a Designated Conservation Area. Today nearly every building, including over 900 houses, is Grade II listed, so protecting the village's character.

Port Sunlight offers plenty of places to eat and drink, including the **Bridge Inn**, **The Railway Inn** and **Port Sunlight Village Social Club**. For that special occasion why not try **The Leverhulme Hotel & Spa**, which was once the village hospital - it is now a stunning luxury art-deco boutique hotel.
